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Branch History

In 1946 the Portland/Middletown NAACP Branch was formed by a group of concerned African Americans from both towns. Mr. Roosevelt Steele, a Portland resident, became the first president. The Branch thrived for several years taking a stand for the rights of African Americans during the early days of the civil rights movement. Early presidents were Mr. Charles Ghent, Mr. Roosevelt Steele, Sr., Rev. William Davage, and Captain Edward Jackson.

It was years later, when Captain Edward B. Jackson, retired member of the Middletown Police Force and Mrs. Reba Moses, a community activist, met with Mr. Willie Walton to talk about forming a branch of the NAACP in Middletown. After meetings with Mr. Benjamin Andrews, President of the CT State Conference of NAACP Branches and nearly 100 community members, the branch was reestablished. Mr. Willie Walton became the first president, serving three years. In its earlier days, the branch published a "Watchdog" weekly paper. James "Cup" Moody served as its' first editor. The branch was responsible for the establishment of the Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Celebration and formation of the Martin Luther King, Jr., Committee of Greater Middletown, Inc. The Committee eventually became a separate 501(c)3 entity.

One of the branch's earliest issues, uniting the city residents, stemmed from the death of a homeless man who froze to death. Both Black and white citizens came together and marched in protest over the lack of housing. The group demonstrated for three days. In the end, the Eddy Shelter and other shelters were opened in Middlesex County, and they remain to this day.

The work of the Branch, encompassing 16 towns county-wide, continues to be rooted in racial equity, civic engagement, and supportive policies and institutions for all marginalized people. We advocate and serve as a resource for women and children during difficult times, stand for students' right to equitable education experiences, and seek solutions to health disparities that plague our community.

The following individuals have served as President of the Middlesex County Branch since its e-establishment: Willie Walton, James Moore, Roland Cockfield, Debra Hopkins, David Roane, Timothy Franklin, Roxanne Aaron-Selph, Rosa Browne, and Faith Jackson, with Ms. Jackson serving multiple nonconsecutive terms), and Anita Ford Saunders, APR, currently president for the 2023 – 2025 term.

In author Eddie S. Glaude, Jr.'s book, We Are the Leaders We Have Been Looking For, I believe he gives context to "now" and our aspirations once we are able to exhale after this election cycle.

"Democracy, in the end, is much more than a body of laws and procedures; it entails the kind of persons we are to be in community with others."

Social justice does not take a vacation. The people we honor tonight have demonstrated that, most times without even thinking. That's how it should be. They have used their imaginations to envision a righteous community where diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging is not just a catch phrase. It is the aspiration of "now."

Dear Friends:

On behalf of the City of Middletown, it gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the 78th Annual Middlesex County NAACP Freedom Fund Award Dinner. Your presence and support this evening represents your commitment to our shared mission -- a commitment embodied in action, not just words. Thank you for being here, and for all you do to help us build a just, healthy, and empowered community.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People was chartered on February 12, 1909, the centennial of Abraham Lincoln's birth, by a group that included a Black woman, Ida B. Wells, who was born into slavery, and a Black man, W.E.B. Du Bois, who was born into a relatively tolerant community where his family had owned their land for generations. It included as well a German-educated Romanian Jew, Henry Moskowitz, who immigrated to the United States as a child, and a Harvard-educated lawyer, Moorfield Storey, whose Puritan ancestors had been among the first Europeans to settle in New England. And it also included Mary White Ovington, the daughter of Brooklyn Unitarians and granddaughter of Connecticut abolitionists who met Wells and Du Bois after hearing a speech by Frederick Douglass and joining the fight for civil rights, and Lillian Wald, born into a wealthy family in Cincinnati, the daughter and niece of doctors and researchers who would go on to become the founder of community nursing.

The Association's founding members included other names as well, and other stories. The common thread is a recognition of the principle behind this year's Freedom Fund Dinner theme: We're All In. It was a recognition that the mission of advancing civil rights for people of color is a mission to which all people are called to serve, not just those whose rights have been wrongfully abrogated. It is a mission in which all people have a stake. And it is a mission which cannot be complete until all people are truly free. The founders' goal to achieve "the Advancement of Colored People" has never implied the regression of other people -- just as "Black Lives Matter" has never meant that "all lives" do not. The fight for civil rights is not a fight between one group of humans and another group; it is the fight for humanity itself.

All of us must be all in for this fight. I am proud to be a member, ally, and friend of the Middlesex County NAACP, and as we continue the unfinished work of building a beloved community that serves all residents in our city, I am proud to say that Middletown is ALL IN!
